Through this experience, Rotary Peace Fellows build the skills needed to act as leaders and catalysts for peace and conflict resolution both in their communities and around the globe. January 4, 2022 Greetings Everyone!

As we enter the second half of this Rotary year, I would like to briefly share some news on Polio Plus and thank you for supporting this #1 priority of Rotary as we journey toward a polio free world!

Firstly, our number of cases has fallen since 2020; there were only 5 in 2021, 4 in Afghanistan and only 1 in Pakistan. In 2020, there were 149 cases, 56 in Afghanistan and 84 in Pakistan. This is an exciting time for Rotarians, as we can now see the finish line, but, like any race, the greatest effort is needed to cross the finish line. The GPEI (Global Polio Eradication Initiative) launched in 2020 a revision of the strategy for eradication. I will attach a short summary which describes the plan.

As a reminder, check out "This Week GPI", which is updated weekly and is a wealth of information on the progress of polio eradication.

Secondly, a new initiative is happening in District 5550! We are launching a "Polio Plus Society", a program to promote and recognize individual giving to the Polio Plus Fund. This Society is not an official program of RI but many Districts are initiating these themselves to help with the program. To belong, you commit to donating \$100.00 or more per year to this fund and pledge to do so till polio is totally eradicated. Likely several of you are currently committing this amount yearly. For a pledge, a member receives a Polio Plus Society pin and certificate. Remember, all donations receive a 2:1 Bill Gates match, Paul Harris recognition points and a tax receipt!

At present, we are working on the pledge form which will be emailed out shortly.

Thank You for your anticipated support! We are so close to the finish line that we need our greatest effort and donating to Polio Plus or/and becoming a part of the Polio Plus Society is a good opportunity for each and every Rotarian to be a part of the legacy of a polio free world! We need to "Deliver on a Promise" to sustain a polio free world!

I wish to thank the Leadership Team for allowing us to go forth with this initiative.

Polio Eradication Strategy 2022-2026: Delivering on a Promise

In 2020, the GPEI launched a revision of the strategy for polio eradication. Partners and stakeholders collectively identified remaining obstacles to polio eradication, in order to inform a revised and strengthened plan. They then developed optimal approaches to reaching the goal, adapted to the global health context and based on lessons learned.

The strengthened plan aims to achieve and sustain a polio free world through a focus on implementation and accountability. Emphasis will be on cutting outbreak response times, increasing vaccine demand, transforming campaign effectiveness, working systematically through integration, increasing access in inaccessible areas, transitioning towards government ownership and improving decision-making and accountability.

Many of the new tactics and strengthened approaches outlined in this plan are already operational and the plan will officially replace the current Polio End Game Strategy in January 2022

Global Grants – Making Sustainable Change in the World

Rotary clubs in Honduras and Pennsylvania, USA partnered together for a Global Grant to provide eye and vision care to needy residents in Honduras. During a 10-day long mission, Rotarians from both clubs worked to provide a wide variety of vision services through clinics held at local schools and neighborhoods. Over 1,200 individuals were evaluated and 600 received prescription eyeglasses. A local non-governmental organization will continue to provide eyeglasses and medications to those in need.

Improved eyesight can translate into improved educational or occupational opportunities, contributing greatly to improved quality of life for these Honduran residents. Clubs worldwide use these grants to make similar long-term, sustainable improvements in the world.

Every Rotary club has the opportunity to change lives around the world with the help of The Rotary Foundation...one program at a time.

Words from a Past Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholar

"During my time as a Rotary scholar, I learned to look at development differently. We often think of international aid in terms of poverty reduction, and we often see poverty reduction in terms of dollars spent and earned. The anthropology of development aims to analyze global aid in another way. We pay particular attention to how initiatives play out on the ground to determine just what local communities' needs are and how those needs might be met sustainably and, eventually, autonomously....Rotarians understand that to have the most impact, we need to learn from other cultures. What Makes a Successful Global Grant Application?

Consult with local experts early in the planning process to build a strong program plan and global grant application. The district resource network (see below) can help.

To be approved, your application must clearly describe how your project, scholarship, or vocational training team:

- Is sustainable include plans for long-term success after the global grant funds have been spent
- Includes measurable goals
- Aligns with one or more of Rotary's areas of focus
- Responds to real community needs
- Actively involves Rotarians and community members
- Meets the eligibility requirements in the grant application terms and conditions

The Rotary Foundation's grant model empowers Rotarians to continue advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the implement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

What is a Rotary Foundation Global Grant Scholarship?

Established in 1947, the original Ambassadorial Scholarship program was designed to further international understanding and friendly relations among people of different countries. With the launch of the Rotary Grants model, scholarships are now used to fund study by graduate students whose career goals support one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. The funding is the same as a humanitarian global grant with a minimum scholarship amount of US\$30,000. Upon returning home, Rotary Scholars share with Rotarians and others their experiences that led to a greater understanding of their host country, and what career they will go into in order to meet the seven areas of focus and spread good will and understanding.

All Rotary and Rotaract clubs share similar values and a passion for service, but each offers a unique experience. When you start a club, you'll need to choose a club type, a meeting format, and a club model. Look at the needs of your community and the club's prospective members to decide which kind of club would be best.

CLUB TYPE: First, determine whether your new club will be a Rotary club, a Rotaract club, or a satellite Rotary or Rotaract club.
